Finnish TrailO Challenge pt.8

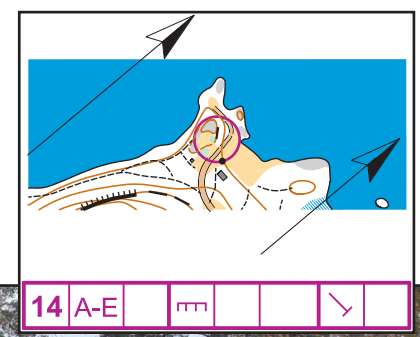

This is the last control which was part of a course first published in the Finnish Suunnistaja magazine. Jari comments, "This photo orienteering imitates the timed controls of trail orienteering, where the map is oriented in the direction of view of the control. More information on trail orienteering can be found on the website of the International Orienteering Federation: www.orienteering.org -> Trail Orienteering, or read CompassSport FEB12 issue for Brian Parkers 'Intro to TrailO for Foot Orienteers.' Note that the map is already oriented. One and only one flag marks the feature located at the centre of the circle on the map and defined in the control

description. The total height of the flag is one meter. All controls have five flags: A, B, C, D, and E. The A flag is the flag furthest to the left, and the E flag the one furthest to the right. Answer the question at each control by giving the letter of the right flag. The North arrow shows North and South on the map. The maps used in this photo orienteering are provided by Keravan Urheilijat, Kokemäen Kova-Väki and Rasti-Nokia. The maps are sprint maps (1:5000, contour interval 2.5 m). Depending on the terrain, a small boulder is at minimum 1.0-1.3 m and a large boulder at minimum 2.5 m. The minimum height of mapped rock faces is 1 metre."

Product Reviews

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Pia Westerberg orienteering necklace and earring set

My earring collection can generally be divided into three categories – small, sensible studs, eye-catching (and hair-catching...) danglies plus the odd novelty pair (think mini Rudolfs). My latest pair are unlike anything I already own. Pia's lovely creations are studs that manage to be subtle yet striking, unusual and classy. 7x7mm squares of glossy silver with an inset orange half in a cross-hatched texture mean they can be worn to work but are a bit special (in a good way). They are nearly 3mm thick so room for the engraving of the Compass Points N-E-S-W round the edges. This attention to detail is seen on my matching necklace, which will be treasured especially as it has our wedding date and initials engraved on it, the earring posts which have grooves cut in them to stop the



backs slipping off and even the pretty little boxes which they come packaged in. Finnish-based Pia does a whole orienteering range (www.piawesterberg.fi) including cuff-links, drop-earrings and colour options like bronze/white or all silver. I particularly like (luckily) the silver/orange set that I received as a wedding gift. Her other ranges include a specific "wedding range" based around a slinky heart design and items aimed towards men and "youngsters". The prices reflect the fact that hers is not costume jewellery, rather hand-crafted and personally engraved works, so make perfect gifts if not everyday purchases (although note that she offers discounts to orienteering clubs).
